

MEMORANDUM BY THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE
AND PARLIAMENTARY AFFAIRS

The attached is a Bill to amend the Criminal Code, Chapter 12. Its object is to repeal the Street-Begging Ordinance (Chapter 47) as well as the regulations made under the said Ordinance.

The necessity to repeal the Street-Begging Ordinance is due to the fact that this Ordinance and the relative regulations which were made in 1901 (a copy of which is hereto attached) have now served their purpose and are completely outdated.

It is to be pointed out that section 2 of the Street-Begging Ordinance empowers the Crown Advocate-General to take proceedings before the competent Civil Court against the relatives of a beggar, when the latter has no means of subsistence and is unable to work and has relatives who are able and legally liable to maintain him. A sort of a counterpart to this provision may be found in section 26 (which had been added by Act VIII of 1957) of the National Assistance Act, 1956 (Act No.VIII of 1956).

It has consequently been proposed by the Commissioner of Police to have the Street-Begging Ordinance repealed and to make street-begging an ordinary contravention under the Criminal Code.

AN ACT further to amend the Criminal Code, Chapter 12.

BE IT ENACTED by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty,
by and with the advice and consent of the House of
Representatives of Malta, in this present Parliament
assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

Short title. 1. This Act may be cited as the Criminal Code
(Amendment) Act, 1966, and shall be read and construed
as one with the Criminal Code.

Code. 2. Section 352 of the Criminal Code is amended by
the insertion of the following new paragraph immediately
after paragraph (w) thereof:

"(wa) begs alms in any public place;"

Cap. 47. 3. The Street-Begging Ordinance is hereby repealed
but without prejudice to any proceedings taken or to be
taken in respect of any offence against its provisions or
against the provisions of any regulations made thereunder.

Objects and Reasons

The Street-Begging Ordinance and the regulations
made thereunder have become outdated and, particularly,
they have become inconsistent with social legislation at
present in force. It is, therefore, proposed to repeal
the said Ordinance with the regulations made thereunder
and to make street-begging a contravention under the
Criminal Code.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING STREET BEGGING, IN TERMS
OF ARTICLE I OF ORDINANCE NO. IX OF 1899.

1. No person shall solicit alms, or any other kind of relief in any street or public thoroughfare, if such person be the recipient of relief from public funds or has been offered and has refused out-door relief or admission to a Charitable Institution.
2. Persons who have not been offered relief from public funds, shall not be prosecuted for soliciting alms, except in the case that the Superintendent of Police be of opinion that such persons are in possession of sufficient means, or that they are able to work for their subsistence.
3. In no case shall a person endeavour to attract sympathy by exposing sores, or exhibiting personal deformities.
4. No person shall cause obstruction in streets, at the entrances of churches, theatres, offices or shops, or follow or in any other way annoy persons, for the purpose of soliciting alms.
5. No person shall solicit alms at or in the immediate vicinity of Marsamuscetto Steps, Porta Reale, Victoria Gate, the Upper and Lower Barraccas, St John's Church, the Market, the Nibbia Chapel or in the public gardens.
6. No person shall cause children to beg alms, or to guide or accompany a beggar of alms, and no person shall be allowed to solicit alms by proxy, or by an agent.
