MEMORANDUM FOR CABINET BY THE HON. MINISTER OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND TOURISM

Refund of 10% Surcharge

In November 1964 Cabin et declared that 66 2/3% of the surcharge imposed by the British Government on certain imports into the United Kingdom be refunded for a period of one year as from the 26th October, 1964. This authority lapses on the 26th October.

- The British Government, consistent with its clared policy that the surcharge was essentially temporary and would be reduced as soon as the balance of payments rituation permits, reduced the charge from 15% to 10% with effect from the 27th of April, 1965. As a reduced curcharge is still in force it is for consideration whether the refund system should be extended for a further period of one year. It appears from usually-influential comments in the British economic press that it will be bone time before it is abolished and in any case not before the measures taken by the British Government to check economic growth are relaxed.
