PASSPORT REGULATIONS

1. Applications for Passports must be made in the form printed on the back of these Regulations, and presented personally at the Lieutenant-Governor's Office.

2. The charge for a Passport is 5/-. Passports are issued at the Lieutenant-Governor's Office, on the Day following that on which the application for the Passport has been received, except on Sundays and Public Holidays, when the Passport Office is closed. Postage Stamps will not be received in payment.

3. Passports are granted-

(1.) To natural-born British subjects;

(2.) To the wives and widows of such persons; and

(3.) To persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies or in India.

A married woman is deemed to be a subject of the State of which her husband is for the time being a subject.

4. Passports are granted—

(1.) In the case of natural-both British subjects, upon the production of a Declaration by the applicant in the form printed on the back of these Regulations, verified by a Declaration made by a Magistrate, Banker, Minister of Religion, Physician, Surgeon, Advocate, Legal Procurator, or Notary Public, resident in these Islands. The applicant's Certificate of Birth and other evidence may also be required.

(2.) In the case of children under the age of 16 years requiring a separate Passport, upon production of a Declaration made by the child's parent or guardian, in a Form (B), to be obtained upon application to the Lieutenant-Governor's Office.

5. If the applicant for a Passport be a Naturalized British subject, the Certificate of Naturalization must be produced with the Deglaration.

- Naturalized British subjects will be described as such in their Passports, which will be issued subject to the necessary qualifications.

- 6. Passports are not available beyond two years from the date of issue. They may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, after which fresh Passports must be obtained. The fee for each renewal is 25.
- 7. A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission of Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of these Islands by post.

T is hereby notified that applications for Passports will not be accepted in future unless the application form be countersigned by the Police Divisional Inspector of the district in which the applicant resides.


